In reviewing the Ashwaubenon School District and our schools' Report Cards, we have much to celebrate. Two of our buildings, Pioneer and Valley View, attained an overall accountability and rating that placed them in the "Exceeds Expectations" category. Parkview and the High School attained a rating of "Meets Expectations". The district rating this year places us at "Meets Expectations"; we are just 0.9 points from "Exceeds Expectations".

Areas of strength and areas to be addressed:

ASHWAUBENON HIGH SCHOOL

- The graduation rate and closing the gaps of subgroups showed an increase from last year.
- Student achievement in reading and math held steady.
- Attention needs to focus on closing the achievement gap of Students with Disabilities in the areas of reading and math. The data retreat findings also indicated this and goals were established to focus on this gap.

PARKVIEW MIDDLE SCHOOL

- The priority areas of Student Achievement, Closing Achievement Gaps and On-Track and Post-secondary Readiness all showed an increase from the previous year.
- Student growth in the areas of reading and math need to be studied to determine ways in which we can continue to improve.
- All subgroups showed an increase in reading with the exception of Hispanic students. In math, the subgroups American Indian, Black, not Hispanic, Students with Disabilities and Economically Disadvantages students all showed gains.

PIONEER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

- All priority areas showed an increase: Student Growth, Closing Gaps, and On-Track and Postsecondary Readiness. The biggest gain was noticed in the area of closing gaps in reading and math. Work will continue to narrow the gaps within all subgroups.
- Pioneer moved from a school that "Meets Expectations" to a school that "Exceeds Expectations".

VALLEY VIEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

- Improvements in the priority areas of Student Growth, Closing the Gaps, and On-Track and Postsecondary Readiness were seen.
- An area to monitor is Student Growth. This area can and will be monitored through the use of building level assessments to continue to increase the number of students who reach grade level proficiency at mid-year and at the end of the year.

DISTRICT OVERALL

- We are 0.9 points from reaching the level of "Exceeds Expectations".
- Our goal this year is to continue to support, at the building level, efforts to differentiate instruction for all students to ensure that all students are challenged. The use of multiple assessments; Measures of Academic Progress (MAP), running records and common assessments at the elementary level and common assessments along with EXPLORE and PLAN data at the secondary level will help us monitor all student academic growth.

The Digital Evolution Continues at Ashwaubenon High School

Gone are the days when a pencil, paper and notebook were all that was needed in high school! Ashwaubenon High School has begun its fourth year of a *1 to 1 Initiative*. A *1 to 1 Initiative* is a policy designed to put a computer in every student's hands.

This year the program has evolved to include additional options for all high school students. Students can choose to rent a computer from the school or bring their own computer to use from home. We have seen a huge variety of student owned devices including laptop computers, netbook computers, tablet computers (like iPads, Surface or Xoom) and Chromebooks. Approximately 40% of students have opted to bring their own computer to use from home.

Ashwaubenon has seen what a powerful learning tool a computer can be when a student has access to their own device to use in class every day. Students learn when they are engaged in the process of teaching and learning. Technology has the ability to engage students. When a computer is available every day for every student to use, the possibilities are endless!

The 1 to 1 Initiative will continue to evolve at Ashwaubenon High School as teachers and students learn more about how to best integrate new technologies. The journey continues!



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STEM Pilot at Valley View Elementary

Valley View Elementary School is proud to announce its selection as one of just 44 schools in the United States invited to pilot the newest science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) program for students in grades K-5. The elementary STEM program is designed and developed by Project Lead The Way (PLTW), the nation's leading provider of STEM education curricular programs for middle and high school students. By offering this new elementary STEM program to its students, Valley View Elementary School is expanding its high-quality educational offerings for its students.

Through a series of topic-based modules, students will engage in design problems that encourage collaboration, analysis, problem solving, and computational thinking. The schools participating in the pilot program will test 12 STEM modules and play an integral role in the development of the final version of the curriculum by providing feedback on their experiences to the PLTW. This feedback will influence the development of engaging curriculum and balanced assessment for ele-



mentary students, and the creation of effective professional development for instructors. The final version of the elementary program will be available to all school districts in the United States for the 2014-15 school year.

The Village of Ashwaubenon and the Ashwaubenon School District are partnering to explore the possibility of upgrading several well used facilities in our community. The specific facilities are the Ashwaubenon Community Center, the Ashwaubenon High School auditorium and the High School swimming pool.

To learn more about each project and express your opinions, a Village-wide survey of all residents is being conducted in October. The results of the survey will determine whether these projects proceed forward to a potential April referendum. Ashwaubenon residents can expect the paper survey to arrive in the mail around mid-October. In addition to *the* paper copy, an option to complete the survey online will be available.

A series of community information meetings took place on September 18th, 25th and October 2nd to provide information on the condition of these facilities and to gather feedback from our residents.

Building and classroom visits showed "business as usual". It was especially exciting to see writing happening in classrooms (it's one of our goals) and first graders jumped in with a vengeance.

Staff at all levels are applying summer learning in the area of literacy to daily learning in the classroom. Art classes were writing about works of art and describing the picture and the emotions that came through in the work. All disciplines are talking about the vocabulary of their content. It's so exciting to see the transfer of learning into daily practice.

Staff development opportunities will be offered during the school year and staff will have a "menu" to choose from by the end of the October.
