

As part of the state accountability system, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) produces report cards for every publicly funded school and district in Wisconsin. Each public school and district earns a "score" from 0 to 100 that is called an accountability index score. It is important to know that the 0 to 100 accountability index score is a not a percent correct measurement.

The accountability index score that each of our schools received is based on our performance in four priority areas:

- Student achievement in reading and mathematics on state assessments.
- Student growth, measured by year-to-year improvements in achievement.
- Target group outcomes to help us see the "gaps" between our lowest performing students and our student population.
- On-track to graduation/postsecondary readiness, using reliable predictors of high school graduation and postsecondary success.

A school or district's Overall Accountability Score places the school/district into one of five Overall Accountability Ratings:

On November 19th the state of Wisconsin publicly released all district and school report cards. Here are the Ashwaubenon District and School Results:

Ashwaubenon School District: 64.1 - Meets Expectations
Ashwaubenon High School: 60.9 - Meets Expectations
Parkview Middle School: 61.8 - Meets Expectations
Pioneer Elementary School: 80.3 - Exceeds Expectations
Valley View Elementary School: 68.7 - Meets Expectations

In addition to the report cards publicly available online, we receive a secure report card with additional information to help us in our data-driven planning and strategic planning efforts. Over the past two years, we have been completing a thorough analysis of our Forward test results and district assessments to identify the specific areas where our students are not performing to the level we would expect. We have been involved in an ongoing process to review our curriculum alignment to state standards, invest in professional development, and focus on research-based methods of instruction and assessment. Increasing student achievement is a long-term process that is done over several years and we are fully engaged in this work. We believe that the Ashwaubenon School District is a district that exceeds expectations for our students and families and we will work tirelessly to return to that rating in the state accountability system.
