Hello Parents, Guardians and Community Members,

Welcome to our February, 2025 newsletter. I would like to bring special attention to the upcoming ACT test, which will take place on Tuesday, March 11, 2025. This is a state-mandated test for Juniors in the state of Wisconsin. Due to the length of the test and the test day requirements, only Juniors will attend school in person on that date. Freshmen, Sophomores and Seniors will have a virtual learning day. Their teachers will share information with them as the date approaches.

Parents/guardians of Juniors, there are some things that I encourage you to discuss with your student. This test covers two areas of focus for our school and for students. First, it is a major indicator used by Wisconsin for our school report card. The more students we have who show up and take the test, and the more seriously they take the test, the better we can demonstrate the good work that our students, community and staff do on behalf of students. Second, the ACT test is used in a variety of ways that impact most students: it is still used on many college applications, it is an essential part of many competitive scholarships for 4-year and 2-year schools, it is used by a number of schools to determine which students get into their desired major vs. getting wait-listed for a year, and it is a pretty accurate measurement of a student's readiness for adult life, work, and community involvement.

Here at AHS, we have given students several opportunities to practice for the ACT test. We want them to be comfortable with the format of the questions, the timing of the readings and problems, and to know how the ACT test will grade and check their answers. A few weeks ago, your student also received an email from Mr. Lindauer with some self-paced practice materials for students. I encourage you to ask your student about the test, about that practice, and to encourage your student to take this opportunity seriously. It is in each student's best interest, and in our school's best interest, to have our AHS Juniors do their best work on that assessment. If you have any questions about the test, please feel free to reach out to your student's counselor or to me.

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Hello families!

Despite the cold weather, Farm to School activities are in full swing! So far this year we've offered 18 local menu items at the high school, such as microgreens, bell peppers, and carrots. Many of these local items are available every day at the salad bar. In the winter months, our offerings may change since farms typically have more root vegetables available, such as beets, carrots, and potatoes. These vegetables store well through winter.

The hydroponic farm at the high school is taking a short break from producing lettuce for the district for a deep clean. The towers have been completely dismantled and scrubbed thoroughly. This wouldn't have been possible without the PAES class, which comes into the farm several times a week to help with maintenance, planting, and harvesting. They've put in a lot of time and have done a fantastic job!

We're also excited to be working with the Eco Club moving forward. Some members of the club have already begun helping in the farm, gaining hands-on experience with the hydroponic towers and methods of sustainable agriculture. It's great having them on board!

P.S. The harvest of the month is one of my favorite foods! I love to roast them at 425 with oliveoil and salt until they're tender. Easy and delicious!



Select – Choose beets with firm, smooth skins and crisp leaves. Smaller beets are more tender.

Store – Remove greens leaving about 1 inch of stem. Store beets in a plastic bag in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

Prepare – Rinse beets under cool running water and scrub with a vegetable brush. Beets can be eaten raw or cooked. You can eat the beet greens too!

Add beets to your favorite family meals:

- Add grated raw beets to salad.
- Mix cooked beets into mashed potatoes for a pop of color.
- Add raw or leftover cooked beets to canned vegetable beef soup and simmer until tender.

Make meals and memories together. It's a lesson kids will use for life.

Did you know?

Most of the beets grown in Wisconsin are red beets, but there are also pink, purple, white, and yellow beets. Try a rainbow of beet colors!

 Having earned conference, regional, state, or national recognition
 Having earned induction into state/national coaching Hall of Fame

As emerging technologies like artificial intelligence (AI) become more prevalent, Parkview Middle School and Ashwaubenon High School are proactively developing principles to guide the safe, effective, and responsible use of these tools for student learning. After careful consideration, we have established the following principles:

- Respect for Privacy: Al systems should not be used to access or share private or sensitive information of oneself or others.
- Academic Integrity: Submitting AI-generated work that you represent as your own will be considered as academic dishonesty.
- Responsible Use: Because terms of use allow use for students in grades 6-12, Brisk is the accepted AI system in the Ashwaubenon School District. Other AI systems should not be used by students within the school setting or for school work. Brisk should not be used by students unless given specific permission from their teacher. Students will know that permission has been granted when teachers indicate that the assignment Is yellow or green on the AI usage framework. Unless the teacher indicates it is a yellow or green assignment, students should assume it is a red assignment, meaning AI use is not allowed.
- Analyzing AI: Students should evaluate anything generated by Brisk for accuracy and appropriateness. Students should verify the information by AI or other technology resources for accuracy, and consider potential biases or limitations.
- Reporting Concerns: If students identify potential biases or issues with Brisk or notice unethical
 or inappropriate use of AI, they should report their concerns to their teachers or school
 administrators.

As we move forward with Brisk as an accepted AI resource, we remind parents and guardians that many AI tools students may be exploring at home have age restrictions. For example, ChatGPT (a popular AI resource) currently requires users to be at least 13 years old and requires parental or legal guardian consent for students between the ages of 13 and 18. The website warns that "ChatGPT may produce output that is not appropriate for all audiences or all ages and educators should be mindful of that while using it with students or in classroom contexts." Brisk (more specifically Brisk Boost) is designed to support the learning of middle and high school students. While it offers assistance to improve learning for students, Brisk will not do the work for students.

Our goal is to create a learning environment where AI technologies empower rather than replace the human aspects of education. We embrace these technologies cautiously to prepare students for a future where these technologies are everywhere. What is Brisk Boost?

Brisk Boost is a tool that allows teachers to share educational resources and turn them into interactive activities powered by safe AI. Your student will engage with safe, AI-powered tools like brainstorming partners, checks for understanding, and real-time feedback - all designed to help them better grasp the material.

Why Are We Using It?

We want to help your student succeed by making learning more personalized and engaging. Brisk Boost streamlines lessons, provides instant feedback, and helps students build essential skills like problem-solving and adaptability. It also prepares them for today's world by offering safe, teacherguided exposure to Al in ways that will enhance their learning. Brisk is a tool specifically designed to support the learning of middle school and high school students.

How Does AI Fit In?

Brisk Boost uses AI to offer helpful hints, suggestions, and personalized feedback, but it will never give students the answers or do their work for them. Instead, it's a support tool that helps guide them through the learning process and encourages deeper engagement with the shared resources. The goal is to enhance their understanding, not replace their effort. While there are other AI tools available outside of the school setting that does replace the effort of students, these tools are not allowed to be used in school and we will provide instruction to students about how and when Brisk Boost can be used in class and when it is not appropriate.

Safety & Privacy

Student safety is a top priority. Brisk Boost follows strict security measures to keep all student data private and protected. Only teachers and students have access to their progress, and the platform does not collect or share personal data beyond what's necessary for learning. 
