

As part of the state accountability system, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) produces report cards for every publicly funded school and district in Wisconsin. Each public school and district earns a "score" from 0 to 100 that is called an **accountability index score**. It is important to know that the 0 to 100 accountability index score is not a percent correct measurement and is not similar to what your child might earn on a test in school. The accountability index score that our school receives is based on our performance in four priority areas:

- Student achievement in reading and mathematics on state assessments.
- Student growth, measured by year-to-year improvements in achievement.
- Target group outcomes to help us see the "gaps" between our lowest performing students and our overall student population.
- On-track to graduation/postsecondary readiness, using reliable predictors of high school graduation and postsecondary success.

A school or district's Overall Accountability Score places the school/district into one of five Overall Accountability Ratings:

On November 15th the state of Wisconsin publicly released all district and school report cards. Here are the Ashwaubenon District and Valley View Results:

In addition to the report cards publicly available online, we receive a secure report card with additional information to help us in our data-driven planning and continuous improvement efforts. Our goal of preparing our students to be "college, community, and career ready" is dependent on a number of factors, and the State Report Card provides us with a snapshot of our students at a specific point in time. Our school and district strategic plans list strategies and action steps that we are taking to increase student achievement, help all students grow academically, and close the achievement gap across our subgroups.
